KEY POINTS

+ve	North East Lincolnshire has an emergency hospital admission rate lower than the regional average.
-ve	North East Lincolnshire is significantly worse than the national rate for 2010/11-2012/13.
+ve	North East Lincolnshire's trend is showing a decrease in the violence related emergency hospital admissions.

DESCRIPTION

The inclusion of this indicator enables a focus on the interventions that are effective and evidence-based including a greater focus on prevention and treatment, which need to be considered alongside criminal justice measures for a balanced response to the issue. The NHS contribution to sexual assault services are a public health function. It is also the government's strategic ambition, as set out in Call to end violence against women and girls 2010 and successive action plans to do what it can to contribute to a cohesive and comprehensive response.

Numerator: Emergency hospital admissions for violence defined by external cause codes for the resident population (ICD10 codes X85 to Y09)

Denominator: ONS mid-year population estimates

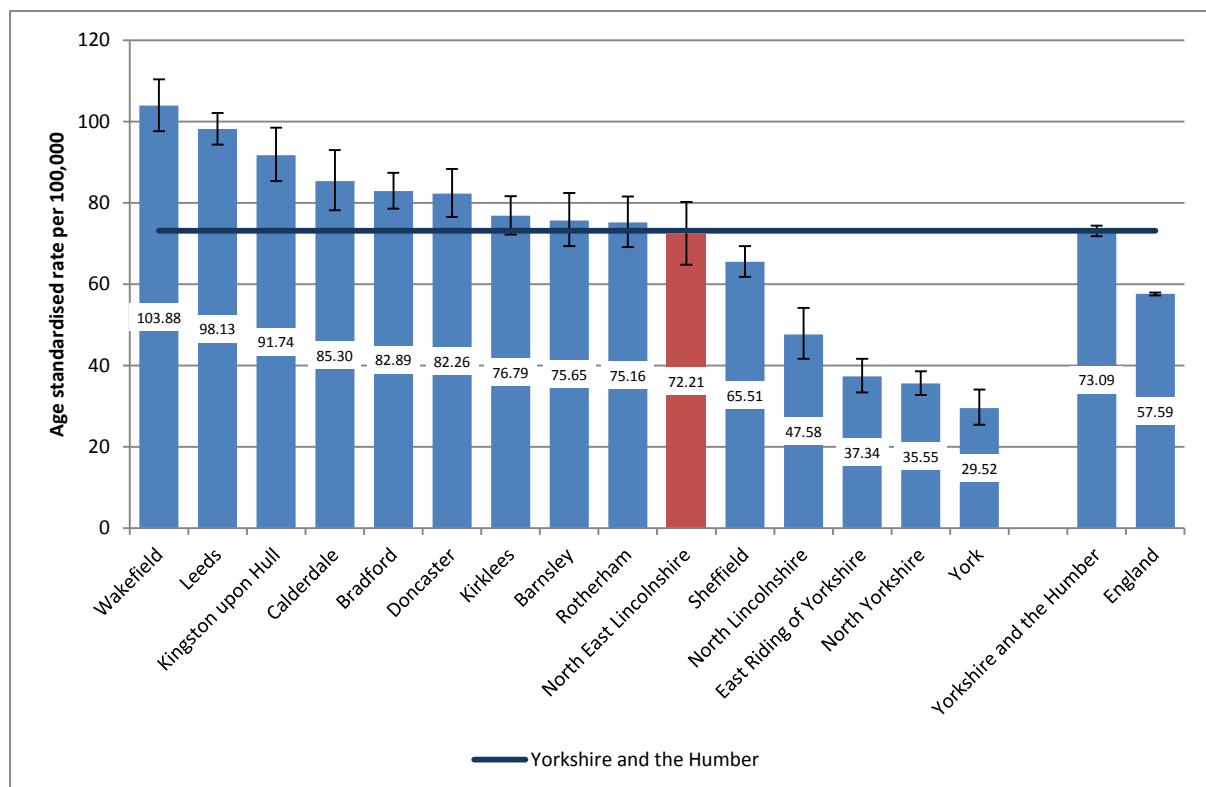

NATIONAL, REGIONAL OR PEER GROUP

North East Lincolnshire had an emergency hospital admission for violence rate of 72.21 per 100,000 which is slightly lower than the regional rate of 73.09; but this was not statistically different (Figure 1). The local rate is considerably higher than the England rate of 57.59 per 100,000.

Figure 1 Age-standardised rate of emergency hospital admissions for violence per 100,000 population, Yorkshire and Humber region, 2010/11-2012/13

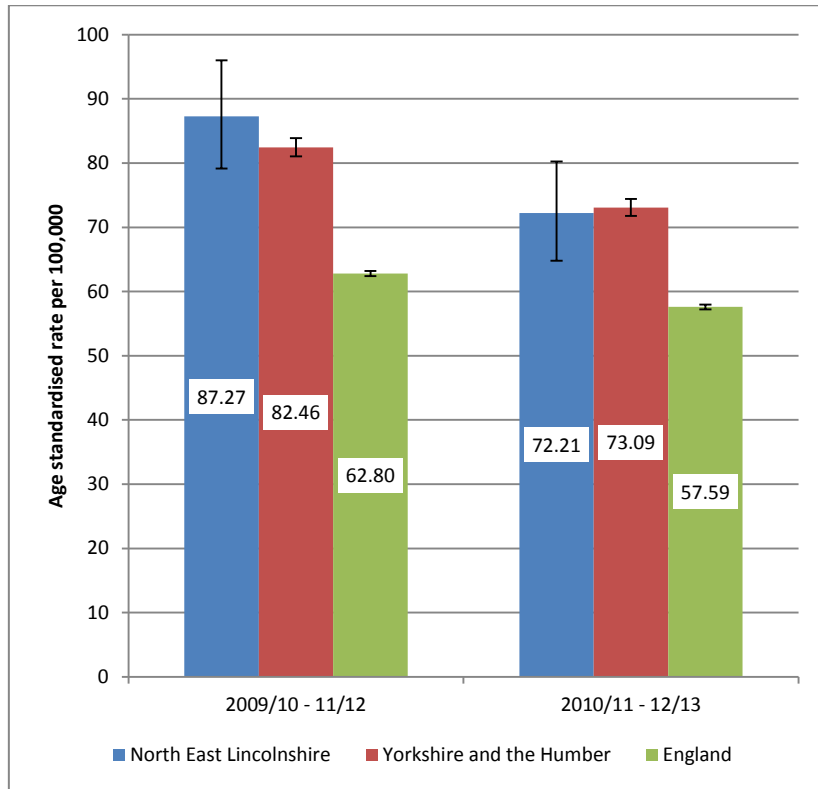

Figure 2 shows that in North East Lincolnshire as well as both regionally and nationally the overall rate of hospital admissions for violence has decreased since the baseline period of 2009/10-2011/12. The rate has decreased significantly nationally and regionally. There was a greater reduction locally from 87.27 to 72.21 per 100,000 but this difference was not a statistically significant.
