KEY POINTS

- An estimated 26.1% of all children in North East Lincolnshire (under 20 years) live in poverty. This is higher than seen regionally (19.8%) and nationally (18.0%).
- North East Lincolnshire ranks 2nd highest out of its 15 authorities across the region comparison group when looking at the percentage of all children (under 20 years) living in poverty.
- Trend data for children living in poverty (under 20 years) indicates little or no change in NEL for 7 years. Over the same time period the England average has decreased by 3.6%
- An estimated 27.9% of all children in North East Lincolnshire (under 16 years) live in poverty. This is higher than seen regionally (20.6%) and nationally (18.6%).
- North East Lincolnshire ranks 2nd highest out of its 15 authorities across the region comparison group when looking at the percentage of all children (under 16 years) living in poverty.
- Trend data for children living in poverty (under 16 years) indicates little or no change in NEL for 7 years. Indeed NEL now stands 0.1% higher than in 2007.
- The three highest levels can be seen within wards South (46.1%) East Marsh (43.5%) and West Marsh (38.7%)

NE LINCOLNSHIRE JSNA INDICATOR SUMMARY

DESCRIPTION

There is evidence that childhood poverty leads to premature mortality and poor health outcomes for adults (see the Marmot Review, 2010). Reducing the numbers of children who experience poverty should improve these adult health outcomes and increase healthy life expectancy.

- Three-year-olds in households with incomes below about £10,000 are 2.5 times more likely to suffer chronic illness than children in households with incomes above £52,000 .
- Infant mortality is 10% higher for infants in the lower social group than the average.
- Only 48 per cent of 5 year olds entitled to free school meals have a good level of development at the end of their reception year, compared to 65 per cent of all other pupils.
- Less than half of pupils entitled to free school meals (just 34 per cent) achieve 5 GCSEs at C or above, including English and Maths, this compares to 61 per cent of pupils who are not eligibleⁱⁱ

The small area estimates are not directly comparable with the national figures.
